# Establishing a shared care programme: enablers and challenges

# Dr Hester Wilson

This workshop will introduce participants to some of the enablers and challenges for Specialist Drug and Alcohol Services working with General Practitioners and Primary Care to better integrate and share the care for people with drug and alcohol issues.

The workshop will discuss a GP and specialist drug and alcohol shared care programme that is currently running in Sydney, Australia.

We will look at what approaches the participants have been involved in and the challenges of local settings; then focus on what local solutions might assist participants to improve GP/Primary Care drug and alcohol shared care solutions.

You will leave the workshop with:

- A better understanding of what GP/Primary Care and Specialist AOD shared care can look like
- A better understanding of the challenges and enablers when implementing GP/Primary Care and Specialist AOD shared care
- Ideas that you might be able to take back to your workplace to begin or continue the process of implementing and working with GPs and Primary Care.

### Dr Hester Wilson BMed(Hons) FRACGP FAChAM

A Fellow of the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners, Hester is also a Fellow of the Chapter of Addiction Medicine in the RACP. She completed her Masters in Mental Health in 2013.

Hester has worked in primary health care settings for the last 25 years and currently works at the Langton Centre in Surry Hills as a Staff Specialist in Addiction and in general practice in Newtown, Sydney.

Hester is the chair of the RACGP SI Addiction Medicine Network, clinical advisor to the Patient Reported Measures (PRMs) programme at the NSW Agency for Clinical Innovation and conjoint lecturer at the University of New South Wales. She has an interest in improving health outcomes for patients with chronic complex illnesses in the primary care setting. In her role as staff specialist, she has developed a GP shared care project aimed at assisting her specialist drug and alcohol service to better engage with general practice leading to better outcomes for patients.
