Associate Professor Vili Nosa is of Niuean descent. He is currently Head of the Department of Pacific Health at the University of Auckland.

Vili has a BA in Education & Sociology, MA (Hons) in Sociology, and a PhD in Behavioural Science from the University of Auckland. His PhD thesis researched the perceptions and use of alcohol among Niuean men living in Auckland. He is the first Niuean to graduate with a PhD.

His academic and scholarly interests include Pacific health issues in New Zealand and the Pacific region. Vili's specialist research area is in addictions, alcohol, tobacco and substance abuse.



Dwaine Faletanoai is of Samoan descent. He is a DAPAANZ Registered Alcohol and Drug Practitioner and an Accredited Clinical Supervisor for Tupu – Pacific Alcohol and Drug & Gambling Service. He has nine years' experience on the front lines of the AOD sector in Youth Work.

Dwaine holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree, Post Grad Certificate (HSc), Post Grad Diploma (HSc), Certificates in Pastoral and Biblical Counselling and a Certificate in Supervision (Human Science). He serves in a dual role as the Youth Co-ordinator and Counties Manukau Youth Clinician for Tupu Service; and represents Tupu in Counties Manukau Youth AOD Collaborative and Suicide Prevention Forum.

Dwaine is currently studying towards his Master of Health Science with a focus on Health Management, at the University of Auckland.
